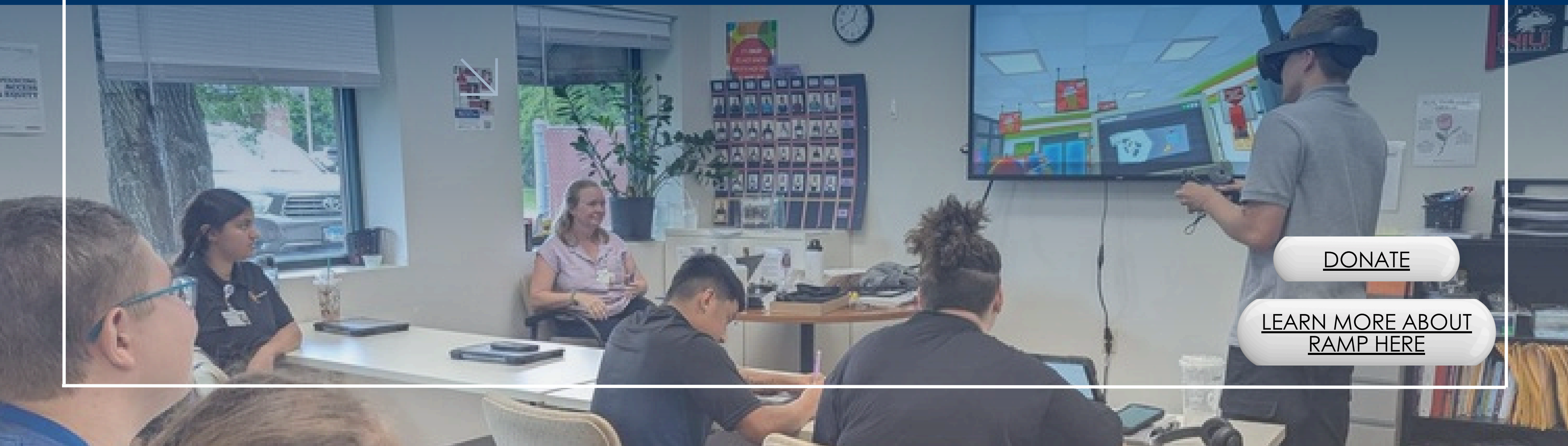

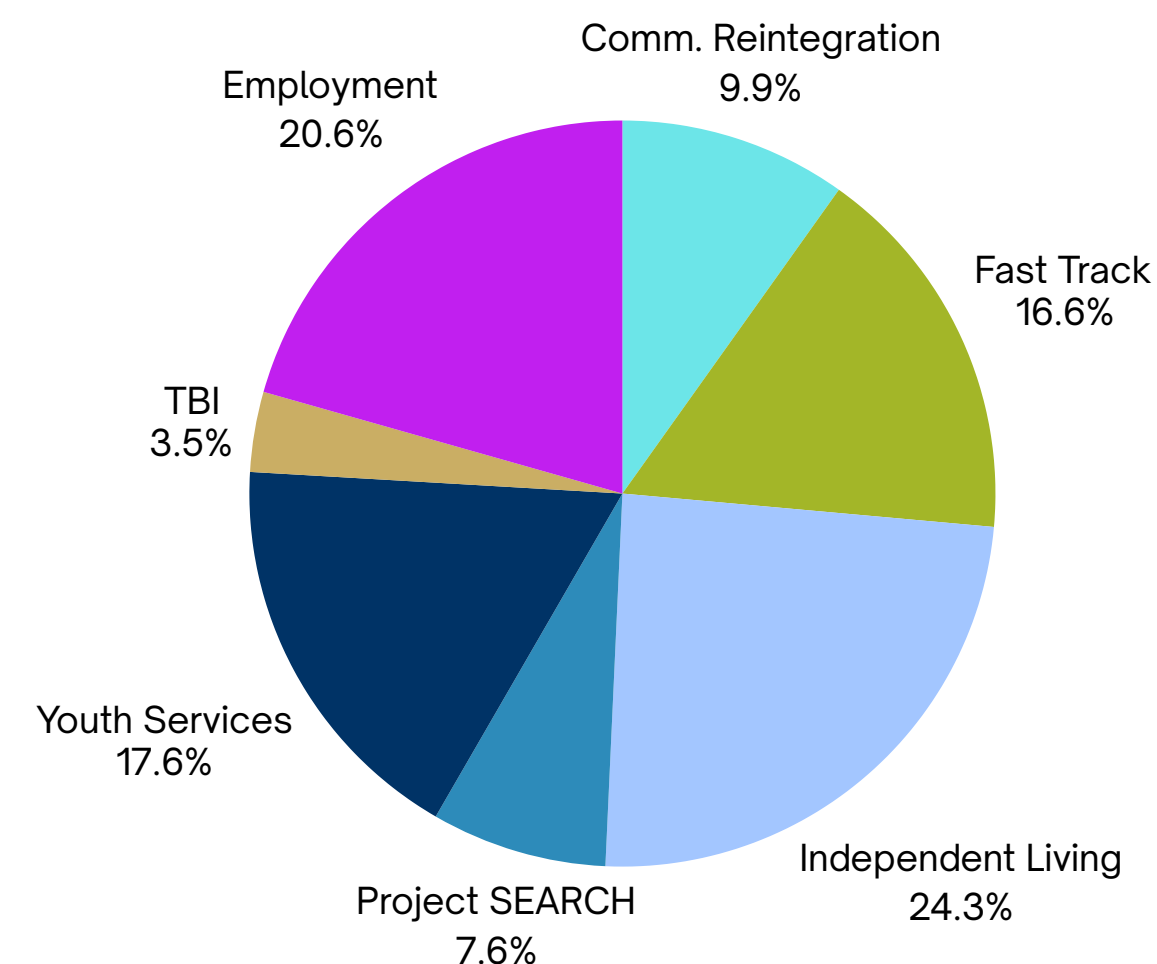
RAMP'S ORIGIN AND HISTORY

- Founded: Established in 1980 by Ken Kerns.
- Significance: RAMP is the 2nd Center for Independent Living (CIL) in Illinois, and it is non-residential.
- Offices:
 - Freeport, Rockford, and DeKalb.
 - Serves Stephenson, Winnebago, Boone, DeKalb counties, and some rural areas.
 - Employment services also extend to the Chicagoland area.

INDEPENDENT LIVING PHILOSOPHY

- Core Belief: Every person, regardless of disability, has the right to make their own choices and direct their own life.
- Promoting Self-Determination: RAMP's services focus on self-determination, ensuring that individuals with disabilities have the same choices and control over their lives as anyone else.

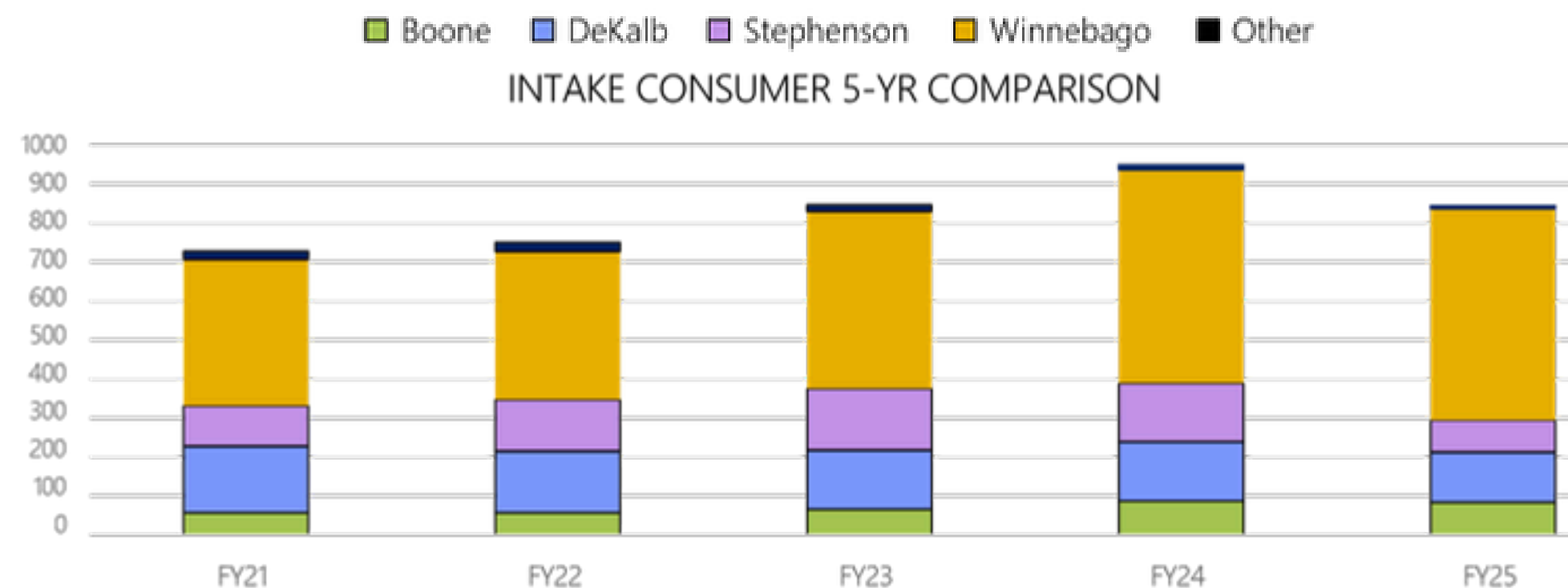
- Mission: To build an inclusive community that encourages individuals with disabilities to reach their full potential based on the Independent Living Philosophy.

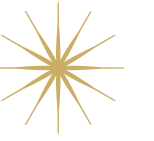
OUR IMPACT

- Reach: Serves over 1,000 people annually through advocacy and support.
- Target Audience: Assists people of all ages with any disabilities facing barriers to controlling and directing their own lives and goals.

WHY WE DO IT

- Prevalence: 1 in 4 Americans live with a disability, and 29% of families are affected.
- Personal Mission: Many staff and board members have lived experience with disabilities, making RAMP's mission deeply personal.
- Empowerment: Helps individuals with disabilities live, learn, work, and play in their communities.

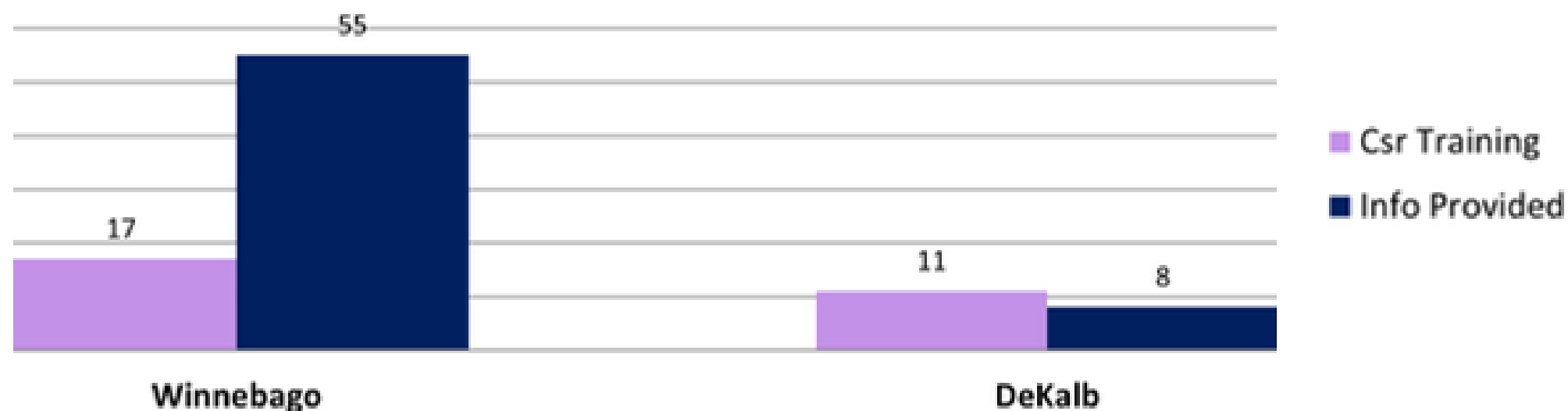




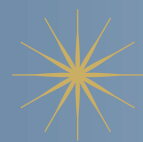
BUS TRAINING

For many, taking the bus for the first time is a major step toward freedom. Funded by Rockford Mass Transition District (RMTD) and the City of DeKalb to provide individuals with the skills and knowledge to navigate public transportation systems safely and independently. RAMP also provides disability awareness & sensitivity training to drivers annually, and assists with appeals that RMTD receives from para-transit applicants/users.

Dale learning how to ride the transit system.

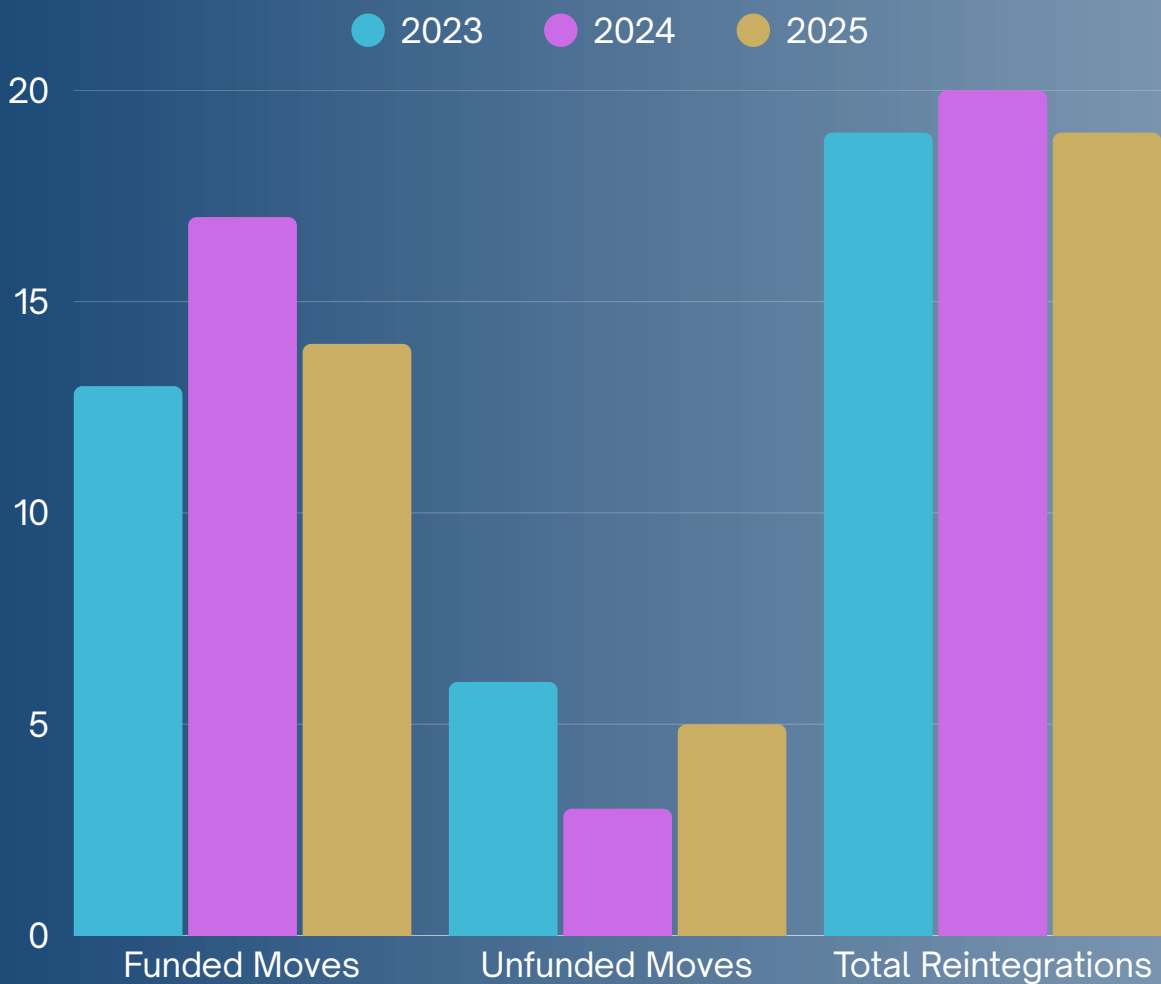


COMMUNITY REINTEGRATION



Leaving a nursing home and returning home transforms lives. Funded by the State of Illinois, this program helps individuals transition from institutional care back into the community with the support they need to thrive at home.

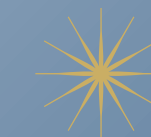

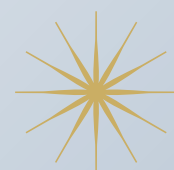
PEER SUPPORT

- A Core Service for all Centers for Independent Living (CILs)
- Provides assistance from individuals who have faced similar barriers and achieved their goals
- Offers real-life experience, not meant to replace professional counseling, but as an additional support
- At RAMP, 51% or more of our staff and board are individuals with disabilities, bringing a positive, personal perspective to support.





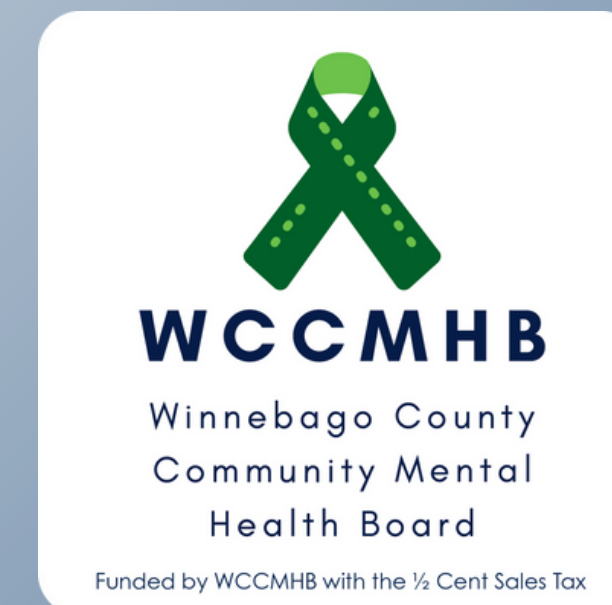
MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES



RAMP helps individuals strengthen their mental health and independence through community partnerships. With funding from the Winnebago County Community Mental Health Board (WCCMHB) RAMP provides independent living services, youth education and advocacy, accessibility audits, and alternative therapies. The purpose of the WCCMHB is to plan, implement, and monitor a system of mental health and addiction services for Winnebago County residents living with serious mental illness and addictions. As a funded partner, RAMP is part of a network dedicated to quality mental health and substance use services for Winnebago County residents. WCCMHB is supported by a voter-approved half-cent sales tax.

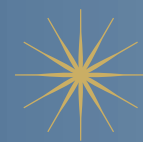

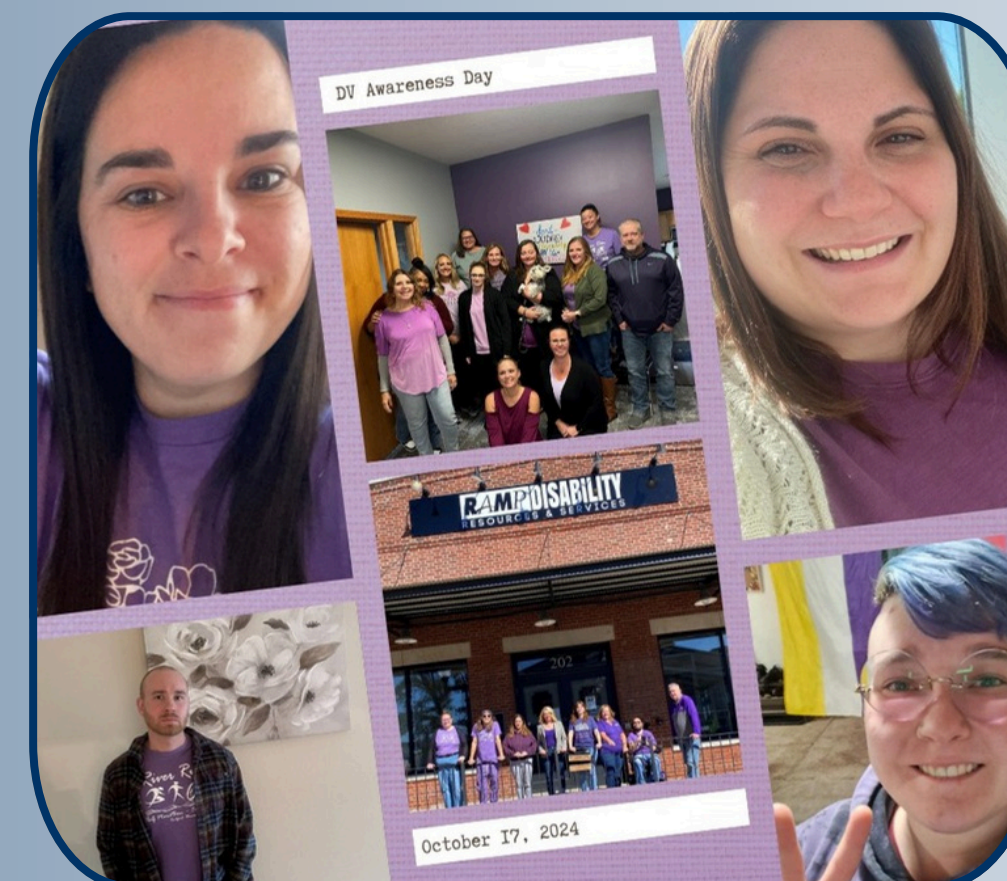


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WINNEBAGO COUNTY COALITION FOR BARRIER-FREE SURVIVOR SERVICES

Everyone deserves to feel safe and supported. RAMP recently completed a three-year grant initiative, funded by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW). Through this, RAMP led the Winnebago County Coalition for Barrier-Free Survivor Services, in partnership with Adult Protective Services, Remedies Renewing Lives, Rockford Sexual Assault Counseling, and the Mayor's Office of Domestic and Community Violence Prevention.

Our coalition's collaborative efforts successfully identified and removed barriers for survivors with disabilities and Deaf survivors of domestic and sexual violence. The result is enhanced safety, improved access, and more welcoming services across partner agencies, with key policy and practice updates implemented to ensure community services are more inclusive and accessible.



On October 17th staff wore purple for Purple Thursday in order to show our support for survivors of domestic violence.

INDEPENDENT LIVING SERVICES



SYSTEMS ADVOCACY



Over the past year, RAMP's systems advocacy focused on protecting disability rights amid funding uncertainty and policy challenges. Efforts included preventing harmful changes, promoting accessibility, and participating in task forces on crisis response, safety, and patient rights. RAMP also provided accessibility assessments, technical assistance, and education across schools, transit, and community groups—working to uphold laws, push for improvements, and combat barriers to equal access.

Accessibility Assessments: Reviewed 5 schools, service providers, and historic venues to support inclusive, compliant spaces.

Technical Assistance: Supported 6 organizations—libraries, museums, parks, and more—to improve community access.



In February Dane Johnson, Autumn Gabriel and Lisa Lynch visited Springfield to advocate for bills supporting increased state contracts, equal wages, and student loan forgiveness. They met with Reps. Maurice West (67th), Amy Murri Briel (76th), and Jeff Keicher (70th).





ADA ASSESSMENTS



- Businesses concerned about ADA compliance or wishing to improve accessibility can contact RAMP for free technical assistance.
- RAMP staff can conduct an onsite Accessibility Assessment and provide written suggestions for modifications, if desired, based on the Illinois Accessibility Code and the ADA (fee-based service).
- Total access to customers is not only required by law, but it's also good business.

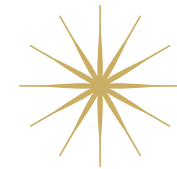

- Available to individuals who meet eligibility requirements.





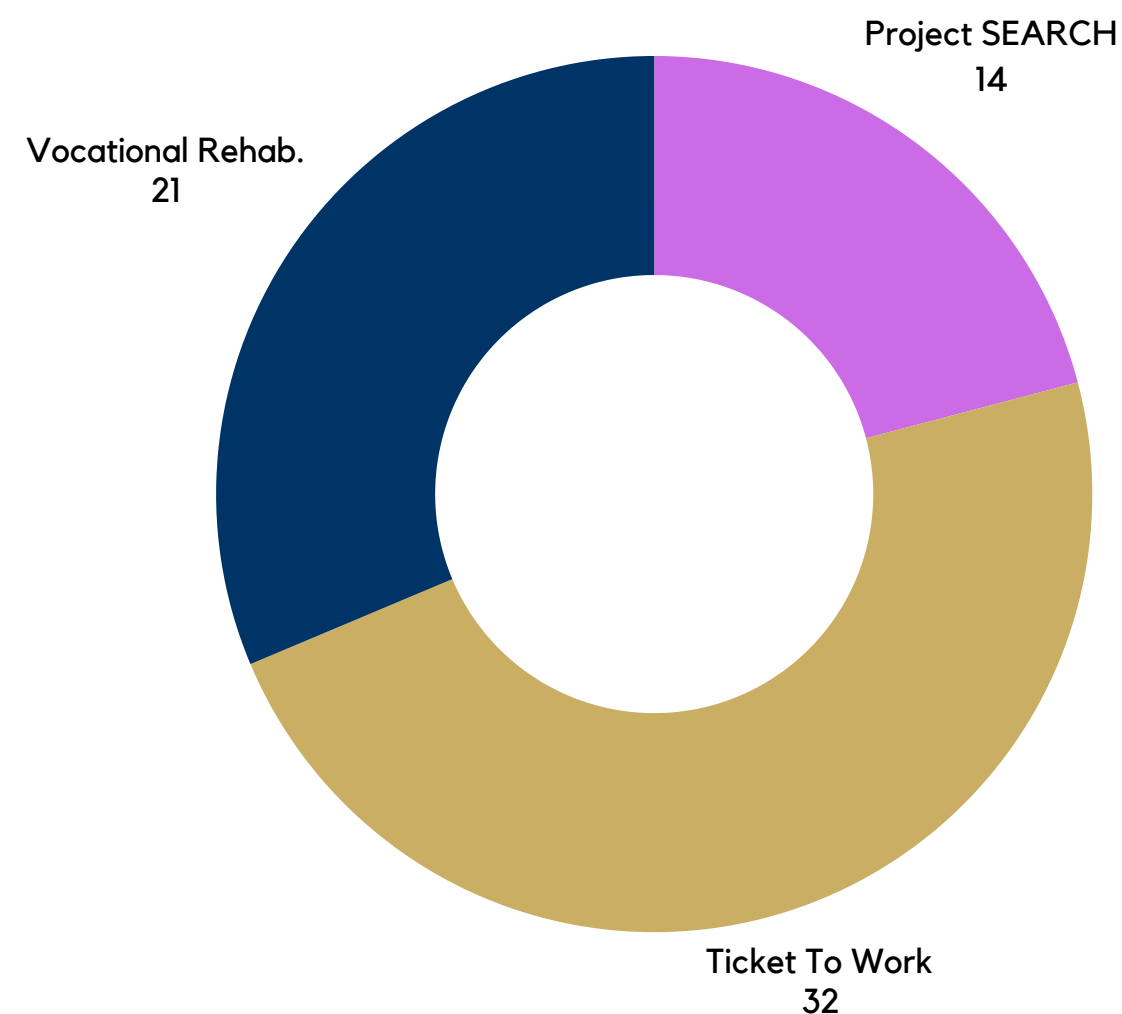
EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

BENEFITS OF HIRING INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES

- Receive federal tax credits such as the Work Opportunity Tax Credit, Disabled Access Credit, or Barrier Removal Tax Deduction.
- Employees with disabilities often have higher retention rates, lowering turnover costs.
- About 92% of U.S. consumers prefer to support businesses that hire individuals with disabilities.
- Hiring people with disabilities does not increase insurance rates.
- Many workplace accommodations cost little to nothing, making inclusion affordable and beneficial.



PROJECT SEARCH



100%

of 2024 graduates have obtained employment in the community AND are more satisfied with where their life is and their financial stability now that they have obtained employment.

Project SEARCH is a unique, business-led, school-to-work program that takes place entirely at a healthcare, government, or business setting. Selected students work in three internships over the course of the year in combination with classroom instruction, goal setting, career exploration, and hands-on training through worksite rotations. Each student works with a team that includes their family, an instructor, a department mentor, rehabilitation counselor, and skills trainers to create their employment goal and to support the student during their transition from school to work.

RAMP has three Project SEARCH locations: two in Rockford at Mercyhealth and Embassy Suites downtown, as well as one in DeKalb at Northwestern Medicine Kishwaukee Hospital.



Project SEARCH interns at Northwestern Medicine Kishwaukee Hospital took part in Employment Prep Day, practicing skills like resume building, phone calls, and interviewing to prepare for future employment.



At the Project SEARCH conference, Embassy Suites was the only Illinois site to earn the 2023-2024 100% Employment Outcomes Award!

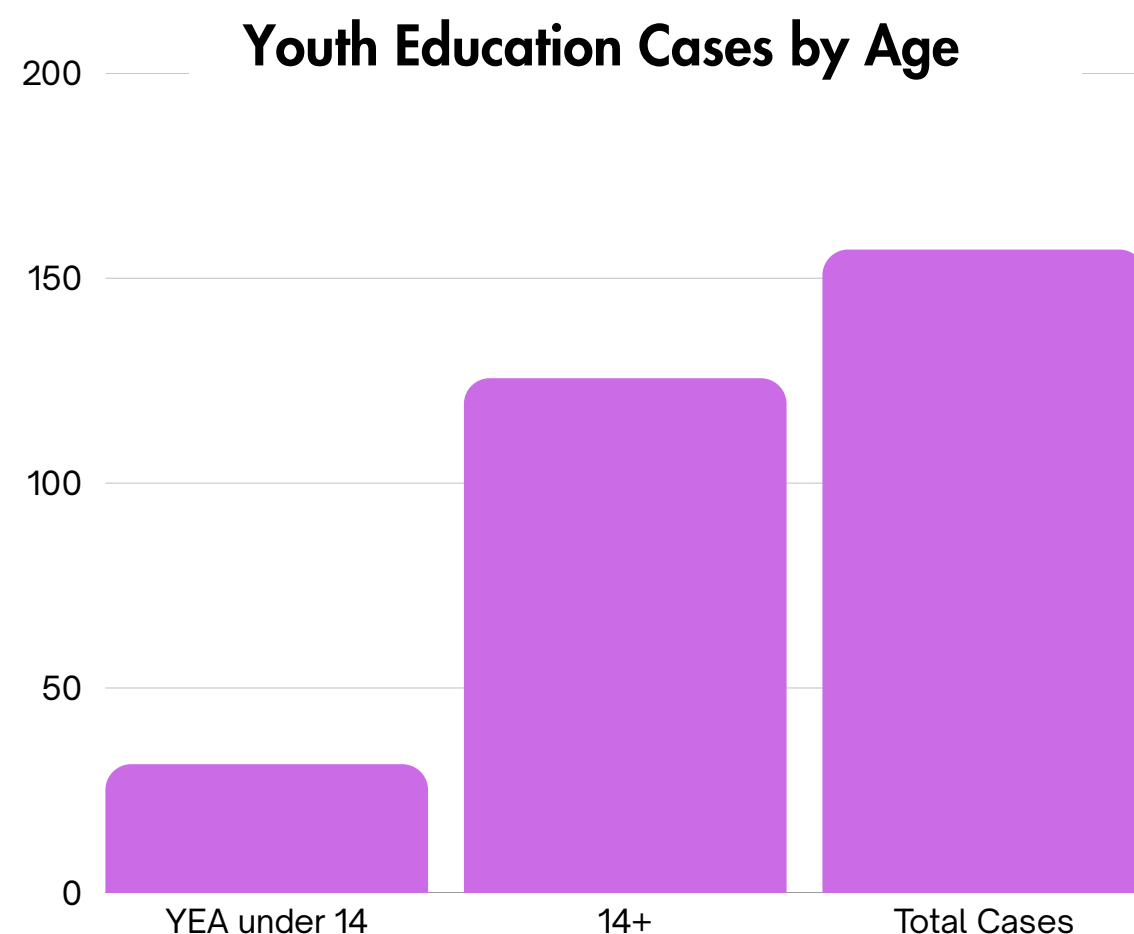
BENEFITS OF PROJECT SEARCH TO THE HOST BUSINESS

YOUTH EDUCATION ADVOCACY

RAMP's support helps students and families gain clarity and confidence. We guide you through understanding the legal rights of students with disabilities, simplify the process of accessing key community services, and focus on skill development so every student can successfully pursue their goals.

- Educating students and their families on their rights within the school system.
- Training families on disability laws and the special education process.
- Attending IEP/504 meetings with families as requested.

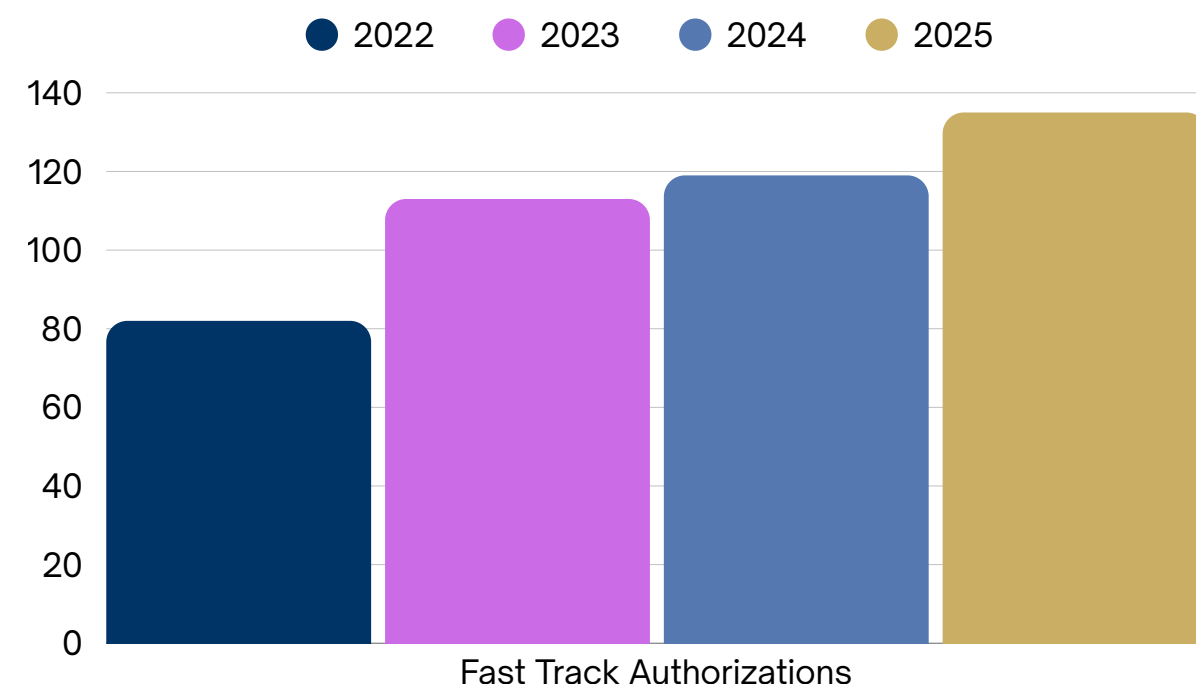

Our program provides youth aged 14-22 with focused guidance on career exploration, employment skills training, and hands-on internships. 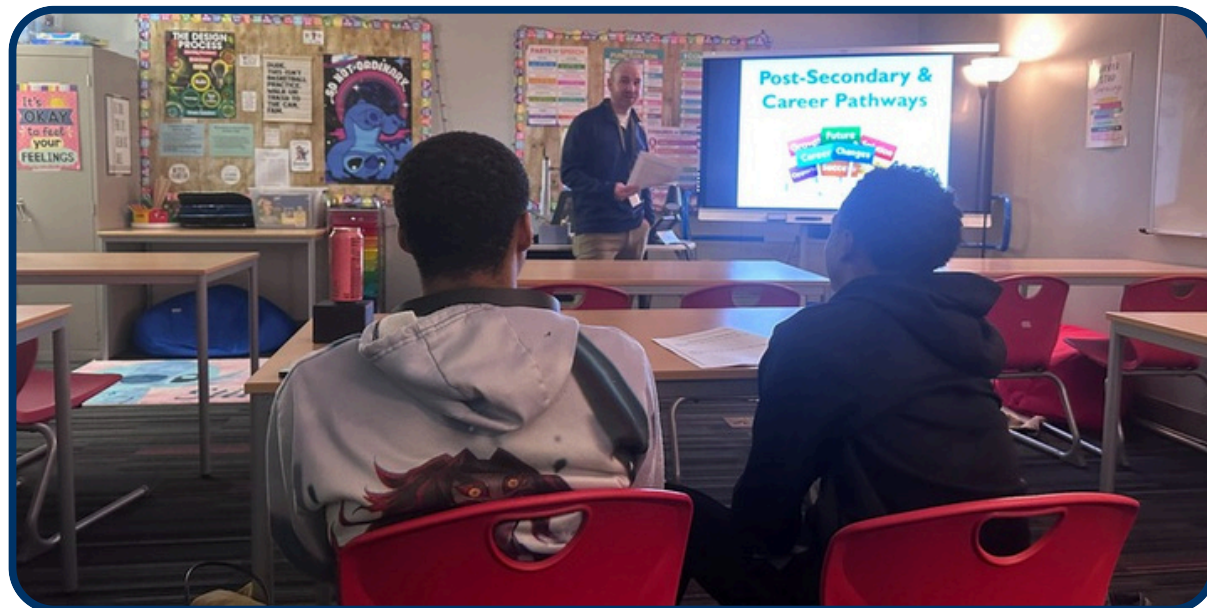

PATHWAYS TO PARTNERSHIPS



RAMP is proud to join the new Pathways to Partnerships (PTP) pilot program in Illinois! Through PTP, RAMP staff are partnering with the Illinois Department of Human Services and Rockford Public Schools to help students with disabilities prepare for adulthood - including valuable real-world job experience. What makes this program especially exciting compared to RAMP's other transition initiatives is its employment component - students will have the opportunity to gain real work experience through jobs in the community.

CURRICULUM

OnRAMP's curriculum is age-appropriate, cross-disability, and flexible enough for ease of implementation. The curriculum meet mandated standards including Common Core, Indicator 13 Transition Plan requirements set forth in the IDEA 2004, and 5th Core requirements for Centers for Independent Living (CILs).



Over spring break, YEA Janet led a week-long iBelong session at Amity in Freeport, teaching 35 kids (ages 5-12) about disability awareness, inclusion, and acceptance.

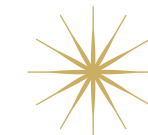
